First, 60% of coconut farmers in the Philippines live on less than \$2.00 a day. The supply chain with conventional coconuts is very long. For example, an average coconut costs \$0.89, but farmers who work for non-fair trade companies don't get much of that money back to pay to grow more coconuts to make money for their families. With fair trade, the supply chain is very short and the coconuts come directly from the farms to us. Farmers then get enough money for their families and to grow more coconuts.

Secondly, the places where coconuts are grown are being affected by climate change and this affects farmers because their coconut trees can get damaged and they can't pay to regrow them. For example, the Philippines get hit with an average of 20 typhoons per year. When a typhoon strikes most of the coconut trees get destroyed. This is devastating for farmers because it takes 10 years for a tree to start producing coconuts. Fair trade helps with this problem because they are paid fairly enough to be able to plant and grow more coconuts and then more of the trees will survive.

As you can see it is very important to buy fair trade certified coconuts so the money can get back to the farmers that deserve money. One solution is to stop buying non fair trade certified coconuts so that the companies that sell the products become a fair trade certified company. So to sum it up it is important to buy fair trade products so everyone gets an equal pay.
